

Millwood Community Updates

These first few months of school have been very busy. As I look back, the three main areas we have been focusing on are our K-12 curriculum, our student life, and our preparation for college.

Firstly, let me share an update on our curriculum. We have been reviewing the math curriculum K-12 and have recently purchased an upgraded curriculum that seamlessly links our Lower, Middle, and Upper School. Next on our list is the



review of our K-12 language curriculum. Our goal for all of our curricula is to have a more cohesive program that runs seamlessly throughout the entire school whereby the students are able to smoothly transition from one division to the next.

In our World Language classes, students have been studying "The Day of the Dead" and exploring the regions of France. The Upper School students will also have a special guest speaker for our first "Star of the Day" interview. There will be more to come on this later. Art has been celebrating famous artists, and students are able to take part in some art competitions such as "Scholastic Art" for grades 7 and up and "Southern Teachers Agency" for grades 8 and up. Our music department has been working very hard preparing for our winter concert. We look forward to seeing and hearing our students and guest performers sharing their talents with our community.

Secondly, there are ongoing activities focusing on student life. We are resuming our SCA (Student Council Association) and welcome new and interested applicants from grades 6-12 to help drive our school to the next level. We have also been reviewing our advisory program so that the students are able to find a balance between practicing our Big 10 Code for Self-Discipline and taking time to take care of themselves using mindful moments from Mrs. Yakim. Lower School students, along with guidance from their classroom teacher, practice the Big 10 daily through discussion and role modeling.

Monday Morning Meetings have been shared virtually as we have heard from our Middle School science class, our Lower School students, and our seniors. Field trip preparations for 8th - 12th grade to go to Spain in February, 2022 are well underway. We are looking forward to taking our students on an unforgettable experience. Lower and Middle School students have also had a surprise for their recess and break time as Mr. Gomez has upgraded our Gaga pit.

Thirdly, there has been much work on college preparations. Seniors have been working extensively with OptimumEd since the beginning of the semester and are well placed to go to the college of their choice next year. The Juniors are now preparing for their college of choice as they had a second meeting on December 16 to continue the college application process. This addition has helped build our current program and, with OptimumEd's help, has enabled us to meet the need of each student precisely.


Sanctuary brought animals to our campus for the students to see firsthand. They even enjoyed pony rides!




3rd Grade Students Map It Outside!




thinking through the structure of the game, creating a plot that was detailed and thorough, and expertly hand-drawing all the artwork. Great work, Jonathan!

Students Experiment with Capillaries in 7th Grade



10th Grade Remembers "Gilgamesh"



Mrs. Hardwick-Ivey's Eastern Literature class studies a variety of texts each year. The current sophomores read Gilgamesh in their freshman year and were given the option of taking a test to show understanding or to create something that could be shared with the class demonstrating their understanding. Only a small number of students chose the test option.

The opportunity to encourage students to think outside the box is evident at all levels and across the curriculum. This is a way for our students to demonstrate how they strive for excellence in scholarship.

Middle School Digital Skills & Tech

Our sixth graders in Technology Innovations have now worked through the select, prototype, test, and iterate steps of the engineering design



process. Two groups emerged with different ideas on how to make trick-or-treating safer during the pandemic. One group decided to use a tube system and the other used a launch approach.

Each group created miniature prototypes, received feedback,

and then created larger, working prototypes. The groups experienced some setbacks, but we reviewed how even the greatest inventors learned from trial and error. The groups are now putting their finishing touches on communicating their solutions by using iMovie to create short videos about their products. I look forward to sharing those videos as part of the next newsletter.

Middle & Upper School French

Madame Wertz's 6th grade class is working in groups on a project that will include information on 4 different Regions of France, one of them being an overseas region. The students are learning more about France and its history. After break, each group will present their slideshow to the class. Here they are working on Chromebooks to fill in their research page.

The purpose of this celebration is to increase our understanding and appreciation of the francophone world by exploring how French touches our lives. 

Students in first, fourth and fifth grade have been working on their first book report of the year. It is evident that the students were totally involved in demonstrating their understanding and showing the pleasure they received from reading and sharing their books.

First graders shared an oral presentation about their books. They dressed as one of the characters in the story. The students were able to demonstrate understanding while practicing their public speaking skills. Classmates were able to show good listening skills as the presentations were given. Fourth grade students in Mrs. Bowen's class were reading books from the Fantasy genre. One of the goals of this particular report was to present the information in a portfolio format. They designed the table of contents to guide them through the report. The report included chapter summaries, a character analysis, research on the author, exploring new vocabulary, and rating the book with an explanation on their opinion.





For the past six weeks, Ms. Epps' fifth grade class has worked diligently on expanding their knowledge of writing styles, book genres, and how those works and techniques are related to their academic and communal lives. Our students are proud to display their hard work, creativity, and passion for reading and writing, through their Cereal-Box style book report.

For their book report, students were provided with three must-haves; their book had to be fictional, they were to follow the guided-rubric that prompted them with information addressed on their cereal box, and they were to be as creative as possible in displaying their knowledge of their book. The fourth graders were very surprised and excited to see the notes of kindness and encouragement. We are extremely proud of our students.




From the Head of School Our Children's Well-Being

In these uncertain times, the welfare of our children is of utmost importance. There may be some things beyond our control, but many things for which we can plan. Our children's social, emotional, and physical health need our attention. Children are being asked to learn in the toughest of situations. They may not be able to express what they are feeling, but their actions signal the need for guidance and support.

It's important for children to stay connected and socially active. With distance learning comes a certain amount of screen time that is necessary for success. Balancing screen time can be a challenge. Connecting with family and friends through FaceTime or engaging in creative game play such as Minecraft with classmates encourages children to stay socially active. If there is a close friend or family member in their social circle who they can spend time with while still remaining socially distanced, this could be beneficial to their social well-being.

Emotional health may involve relieving stress or feelings of anxiety. Mindfulness presents strategies that address dealing with strong feelings such



as anxiety. One such strategy is deep breathing. Deep breathing is a way to slow down the body and brain, and help the child to feel calm and clear. When children are facing strong emotions deep breathing techniques can be very beneficial. Alphabreaths: The ABCs of Mindful Breathing by Christopher Willard, PsyD is a great resource. Journaling can also help to clear children's minds and deal with emotions.

Eating a balanced diet is one way to promote physical health, as is regular exercise and getting plenty of sleep. Keep children to a schedule with consistent routines. Have them get up in the morning and go to bed each night at the same time. Getting

enough sleep helps keep children's mood in check and gives their body a chance to heal and replenish. Getting plenty of exercise is a huge benefit to maintaining a child's physical health. It is also advised during this pandemic that children spend as much time as possible outdoors. Colder temperatures should not deter children and families from participating in outdoor activities. Take a nature walk and use your senses to be mindful of your surroundings. Play games outside with your family.

The support of family is key to helping children achieve social, emotional, and physical well-being. Remember that there are resources in our schools and community to lend a helping hand to families in need. School counselors are a great resource for our children. They can also connect families with community organizations that are able to support the needs of children and their families.
